2024 Community Awards


In January 2024, Cameron Station received two prestigious awards from the Washington Metropolitan Chapter Community Associations Institute in their 2023 competition:

The Mark Pillow Community Spirit Award

The Mark Pillow Community Spirit Award was created in 2006 in memory of neighbor Mark Pillow, who passed away the previous year. Mark was a kind and generous community volunteer who embodied the spirit of Cameron Station and made it a better, brighter place to live.

Pride of Ownership Contest


In the spring of each year, the Common Area Committee (CAC) recognizes Cameron Station homeowners whose front, or front and side, gardens are exceptionally attractive.



West End Farmers Market







In the summer of 2007, former Cameron Station resident Susan Birchler, the owner of Cameron Perks (predecessor of Cameron Café) brought the first West End Farmers Market to Ben Brenman Park, and it has been growing and flourishing ever since. Every Sunday, from 8:30am to 1pm, more than three dozen vendors exhibit their wares, including farm-fresh vegetables and fruits, fish, barbecue, coffee, lemonade, baked goods, popcorn, flowers, a variety of crafts, clothing, and jewelry. There is truly something for everyone at the West End Farmers Market. In 2023, the market extended its season to April through December. But last month, the city granted permission for the market to be **open all year 'round!**

IndoChen

IndoChen continues to be a favorite for patrons in Cameron Station and beyond, and is now open seven days a week. Chef Ram Thapa's delicious menu of Indian/Chinese fusion has a number of new items added this year. Also new this year were several Chef's Wine Dinners, including one

Thanks to Cameron Station Foodie Carla Besosa for sharing some of her favorite "new" restaurants.

We are fortunate to live in an area where we have a plethora of culinary options. While old favorites are cherished, it's always fun to explore new venues. I'd like to share with you some of the "new kids in town" in our restaurant world.

PADAEK replaced Delia's at 2931 S. Glebe Road and serves an innovative fusion of Thai and Laotian dishes. Definitely try the Nam Khao Thadeau, a fried coconut rice salad with an excellent blend of flavors and textures.

THE ROYAL has been at 730 N. St. Asaph Street for decades. Now under new ownership, they've added some new dishes. They also have a newly instated Happy Hour, which includes delicious Smashburger Sliders.

PIECE OUT, at 2419 Mount Vernon Avenue, was temporarily closed while expansion and renovations were underway. The new and improved Piece Out is back in business! I love their pizza, but many other options are available as well.

In Shirlington, **CORSO ITALIAN** and **OUR MOM EUGENIA** deserve to be on your "to do" list. Italian and Greek, respectively, these delightful restaurants take you to Europe without the expense of a plane ticket. I particularly like sampling the variety of appetizers, and each establishment has a top-notch Happy Hour.

Replacing Faccia Luna at 823 S. Washington Street, we now have **FRANKIE'S KITCHEN & COCKTAIL BAR**. The Bianco Veggie pizza is delicious, and the Baked Artichoke Dip is the best I've ever had. Enjoy Happy Hour with friendly bartender, Kevin.

MacMILLAN SPIRIT HOUSE resides at 500 Montgomery Street. I have only been for Happy Hour, but the menu seems replete with whiskey and food options. The patio looks like fun, and appears to be multi-seasonal.

I can't say enough good things about one of my new favorites, FAVA POT. This is a family-owned-and-operated establishment at 7393 Langston Boulevard, serving Egyptian and Middle Eastern delights. The Koshary Bowl is a must, blending many exquisite flavors and textures. "Eat Like an Egyptian"!

Thomas Harvey is the owner/chef of the alluring **HARVEY'S**, at 513 W. Broad Street. With a friendly, neighborhood feel, **HARVEY'S** offers fresh and innovative creations with Chef Thomas' personal touch. Patio and bar seating are available, as well.

ZUKI MOON replaced Kaizen Tavern at 1909 Mount Vernon Avenue in Del Ray. Filipino food is not so plentiful within our local orbit. **ZUKI MOON** serves up a unique mix of plates from Japan and the Philippines. Their Happy Hour is entertaining, featuring an eccentric array of signature cocktails.

Next door to Zuki Moon, at 1905 Mount Vernon Avenue, **ROSEMARIO D'ITALIA** has returned after a brief hiatus. Stylish creations from the "Bel Paese" will gratify, and there's a newly added little bar.

THE FALLS is a new discovery at 370 W. Broad Street. The bar is expansive and friendly, offering Happy Hour daily. There is a wide variety of food to explore, and Freddie and Fernando keep the bar hopping!

DELLA J's, at 7692 Richmond Highway, is a spacious venue with a southern flair. Selections include such things as Fried Green Tomatoes, Cornbread, Chicken & Waffles, Jambalaya, Sweet Potato Pie and Sweet Tea. Enjoy downhome dining, and live jazz on Thursdays.

Beyond Our Communi

Cameron Station Civic Association: What We Have Done...and Are Doing...for You

The Cameron Station Civic Association ("Civic Association") is a volunteer organization formed in 2000 to disseminate relevant information to residents and to help influence City of

Alexandria officials to ensure that we have a prominent voice in city policies and decisions that have an impact on our quality of life and/or property values. Issues the Civic Association has been involved in include climate change and the environment, crime and public safety, education, health services, infrastructure, land use development, open space, tree canopy, traffic, and transportation.

The Civic Association was formed because the scope of the Cameron Station Homeowner's Association (a separate entity which you must join upon acquiring property in our community) is limited to being within the boundaries of Cameron Station and is primarily focused on maintenance and the running of our community. The Civic Association has played a significant role in many projects, including getting the city to:

halt plans to put the Wilson Bridge staging area near our community;

install speed tables in Ben Brenman Park;

• reprogram the traffic lights on Duke Street and Cameron Station Boulevard to make street crossings safer;

get a tot-lot built in Ben Brenman Park;

• require the Virginia Paving Company to make environmental upgrades and commit to vacating its premises

by January 1, 2027 (given its nearly two dozen past city, state, and federal environmental violations);

• enforce violations by tractor trailers parking on South Pickett Street near the back entrance to Cameron Station; and

 not make the zoning changes issued under its Zoning For Housing initiative, passed in 2023, applicable to our Coordinated Development District ("CDD"). This year has been a busy year for the

Civic Association. We were involved in:

• expediting the repairs to the Ben Brenman pedestrian bridge;

• commenting on the Eisenhower Avenue transportation study to try and lessen traffic congestion on South Van Dorn Street;

• commenting on the Ben Brenman bikeshare station to try to persuade city staff not to put the bikeshare in the road on Ben Brenman Drive near Somervelle Street;

• commenting on and developing allies to persuade city staff and City Council not to remove a car lane in each direction of South Pickett Street from Duke Street to Edsall Road;



• successfully persuading city staff not to remove a car lane in each direction of Cameron Station Boulevard as part of their repaying of that road; and

• commenting on the Vulcan Materials redevelopment project across the street from Virginia Paving Company to try and lessen the adverse impacts on traffic along South Pickett Street.

As of the time this article was written, the Civic Association is actively involved in meetings with City Council to try and persuade them to impose proven safety measures such as

reducing posted speed from 35 mph to 25 mph and adding new crosswalks and streetlights rather than removing car lanes on South Pickett. The Civic Association is also actively lobbying the city manager to try and overturn the decision by the staff of the Department of Transportation and Environmental Services of placing a bikeshare on the street in Ben Brenman Park rather than on the grass or some other location in Ben Brenman Park where such placement would not raise safety issues and be closer to bike paths. We expect a decision to be made on both of these matters in 2024.

In 2025, we expect to be heavily involved in the Housing Master Plan 2040 and the Tucker Elementary School Safe Routes to School initiative. It is also possible that, in 2025, the city will be checking to see what progress has been made by Virginia Paving Company on its required departure in 2027,

launching more zoning changes as part of Zoning For Housing Phase 2; and there will likely be new redevelopment projects nearby, since much of Alexandria's future redevelopment is slated for the West End. If any of these matters take place, we will be heavily involved in monitoring and providing input designed to promote our quality of life and property values.

Over the past two decades, the Civic Association has developed long standing relationships with the City of Alexandria

mayor, city manager, city department heads, city staff, and the presidents of many other civic, condo, and homeowner associations throughout the city. As a result of an enormous amount of hard work from dedicated volunteers, the Cameron Station Civic Association has been told by numerous city officials that it is one of the most prominent and respected civic associations in Alexandria. In order to maintain this status, we need to continue to grow and add new blood to the organization, and we would welcome not only new members, but particularly those of you reading this article willing to roll up your sleeves and help us preserve our quality of life and property values.

Beyond Our Community

West End Neighborhood Update

Inova Campus

On September 30. 2024. groundbreaking was held for the 1,000,000-square-footInovaAlexandria Hospital Campus on the WestEnd site (former Landmark shopping mall). Dr. Stephen Jones, President of Inova, said, "This is an incredible milestone not only for Inova, but also for the health of our community. Once complete, our Eastern Region will have expanded clinical programs and services housed in state-of-the-art health care facilities. These new care sites will greatly enhance healthcare access, offering a broader array of clinical programs and services to a larger segment of our

community, improving access to world-class Inova Care." Expected to open in 2028, the Inova Alexandria Campus will be home to comprehensive programs and services that include larger emergency facilities, private patient rooms, and the Schar Cancer Center offering full cancer services, including radiation and infusion. A specialty care center will allow 50 physicians to see patients on the same campus. The ramp from I-395 into the hospital campus is awaiting VDOT funding approval.

WestEnd

WestEnd will have several apartment buildings with retail components, one medical office building, a park, and community gathering space. Folger Pratt is completing the infrastructure on the site, and will begin construction of the buildings in the first/second quarters of 2025. In addition, Van Metre Companies just received approval on 110 townhomes adjacent to the transit center. The townhomes will be priced in in the mid-\$900,000s range. The townhomes should begin construction in 2025. Van Metre was one of the original builders in Cameron Station.





Edgewood Towns

Edgewood Towns has been constructed on Stevenson Avenue. The site of these homes had been occupied by a burnt-out, dilapidated building for approximately two decades. Several developers, including Habitat for Humanity, have tried to design and construct projects on this site for over 15 years without success. Matt Gray is the developer, and there are seven fourstory townhomes on this site for sale in the \$800,000s.

Landmark Overlook

Landmark Overlook, at the corner of Duke and Walker streets, is currently

in the demolition stage. The plan for this project, on the former Big Lots site, features townhomes, stacked units, 362 apartments, and a hotel. The infrastructure and construction of the 88 townhomes is expected to begin in 2025.

Passport Mini Cooper

Passport Mini Cooper is adding an 1100-square-foot addition to their showroom on the corner of Duke and Walker street. The enlargement of their existing showroom is designed to modernize the facility and enhance the customer experience. Construction is expected to begin in early 2025.

Olympus

SP Stevenson, LLC, is redeveloping an existing office building and surface parking lots at the corner of Stevenson and Whiting streets into a seven-story building with 270 units. This midrise residential building will contain 23 committed affordable housing units. The project will include wider sidewalks, street trees, streetscape, and pedestrian improvements.

Adopt-A-Family

For the past 24 years, the Cameron Station Community has helped those less fortunate have a Merry Christmas through the "Adopt-A-Family" program. Neighbors have "adopted" hundreds of families from Samuel W. Tucker Elementary School, who without our help might not have any Christmas celebration at all.



order In for families to participate in this program, their needs are screened by the social worker and principal at Tucker. Lists of needs, some as basic as dishes and socks, along with children's

books and toys, are compiled by the school into a "wish list." These families are then "adopted" by Cameron Station residents, as well as local businesses and organizations.

The Alexandria Tutoring Consortium

The Alexandria Tutoring Consortium (ATC) has been matching community volunteers with early elementary school students in need of reading help since 1997. In that time, ATC has helped over 4,000 children learn to read, starting with 80 kids in four Alexandria City Public Schools (ACPS) in 1997-1998 and gearing up to serve 275 children in 14 of 14 ACPS elementary schools this school year.



ATC has been a part of the Samuel W. Tucker community for many years, tutoring there when the school opened in 2000 until 2011, then returning under the leadership of ATC Book Buddies Coordinator and

Cameron Station neighbor Debbie Glenn in 2018. Dozens and dozens of Cameron Station residents have been involved as volunteers and donors, and at least 12 residents are tutoring this year. Friends of Beatley Library

Friends of the Beatley Library have made a real difference in 2024. As a nonprofit all-volunteer group, the Friends raises funds to advance the mission of the library and support programs that would not otherwise be funded. Through

their 2024 spring and fall book sales, the Friends raised nearly \$65,000 for the library. In addition to providing new comfy blue and lime green chairs to our central library, these funds



supported many of the library program offerings for children, teens, and adults, such as tai chi, author events, and crafting activities. These funds also support Summer Quest and allow library staff to attend conferences.

According to Kay Brown, Friends Board President, Cameron Station residents played a big part in this effort! In addition to donating gently used books, many Cameron Station residents became members of the Friends, volunteered to sort donated books, worked at the books sales, and currently serve on the Board of Directors.



Since the library is located right across Duke Street from our community, you've probably seen the ongoing construction on the exterior of the building. The City of Alexandria is making repairs to flashing near the windows to prevent water incursion and is replacing windows and doors. The goal is to complete repairs, clean, and repaint by early December 2024. To complement this

effort, the Friends will be supporting significant improvements to the interior reading garden. Next up, the Friends hope to fund improvements to the teen section. Stay tuned!

Finally, something else new and very exciting: The Beatley Friends, along with Friends of Duncan Library, have funded a new opportunity for all of us to hear virtual interviews with best-selling authors and thought leaders. Check out the schedule at *libraryc.org/alexlibraryva*.

Little Free Library

On Saturday, May 4, 2019, Mayor Justin Wilson cut the ribbon to open our neighborhood's first Little Free Library, located in the median on Ben Brenman Drive, across from the Cameron Station Boulevard Circle. The library is the result of the generosity of former neighbors David and Stephanie Thorpe, who purchased, built, and installed it, and



hosted the opening ceremony. The goal of the Little Free Library is to inspire a love of reading, build community, and spark creativity fostering by neighborhood book exchanges. The Little Free Library gets a lot of activity, and a second structure has been installed at

the rear of the community, at the corner of Cameron Station Boulevard and Tancreti Lane. Be sure to take advantage of this great neighborhood amenity, spread the word, visit often, and don't forget to share!

Snow Removal

Every kid loves snow good а But there day. are those in our community who do not have the luxury to play all day. They may require medical attention, emergency home repairs, or need to report to work. These and other situations require clear driveways and



walkways for safety, but not everyone is physically capable of shoveling snow. The Cameron Station snow removal contract only requires the contractor to clear snow from Cameron Station roads and communal areas. To fill this gap, volunteer snow shovelers mobilize to help those who may not have a shovel, are physically incapable, or are out of town when the snow falls. If you are capable, please lend a hand to your neighbor during the next snow event. If you do, be sure to hydrate, wear appropriate winter weather gear, use your legs (not your back) when shoveling, and use a serviceable snow shovel. The rewards include getting a full body workout, the satisfaction of making roads and walkways safer, and the gratification of helping your fellow Cameron Station neighbor.

Baklava

From Linda Taousakis Ingredients

Syrup Mixture •3 cups of sugar •3 cups of water •2 cinnamon sticks •Juice of ½ lemon •6 oz. honey
· 2 · 2

Simple Syrup with Honey Preparation:

<u>Step 1.</u> Mix sugar, water, cinnamon sticks, and lemon. <u>Step 2.</u> Cook on stove top for about 20 minutes. <u>Step 3.</u> Add honey and simmer for about 15 minutes or so. <u>Step 4.</u> Set aside and cool. (Can be made ahead of time and saved in refrigerator. When needed, heat it.)

Reminder: Hot baklava/room temperature syrup. Room temperature baklava/hot syrup.

Baklava Preparation:

<u>Step 1.</u> Crush walnuts to a fine texture or whatever texture you desire. A food processor works well for this. Add cinnamon and sugar.



Step 2. Take your filo dough and lay 12 sheets to cover the pan. On each layer spread a very thin layer of melted butter. Once you have laid the sheets, add the nut mixture to cover filo. Add 3 more sheets, repeating the laying process. Do this 2 more times. For the top layer, finish off with 12 sheets.

<u>Step 3.</u> Cut diagonally into diamond shapes and bake at 325 degrees for about an hour until you have reached a goldenbrown color.

<u>Step 4.</u> Remove from oven and let cool. Add hot syrup slowly to baklava; don't forget the corners. Let baklava soak up the syrup. If you feel it needs more syrup, add more to taste. Store for about 3 weeks.

Cranberry Orange Relish From Nicole Gauvin

Ingredients

- 12 ounces of cranberries, fresh or frozen
- 1 orange, unpeeled, rinsed and sticker removed
 ³/₄ cup sugar or equivalent

Preparation

<u>Step 1.</u> Cut the orange into eighths, removing all seeds. <u>Step 2.</u> Add cranberries and orange to a food processor or blender/grinder. Process



until evenly chopped and pour in sugar. Store in the refrigerator; may also be frozen. Makes 3 cups.

Ravani (Sweet Sponge Cake)

From Linda Taousakis

Ingredients

- ½ lb. butter
- 3 ½ cups sugar
- 2 tbsp. baking powder
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 6 eggs, well beaten
 1 large grange rind a
- 1 large orange rind and ½ cup orange juice
- 1 cup chopped almonds
- 1 cup farina or cream of wheat (not instant)
- 1 cup baking flour

Preparation

<u>Step 1.</u> In mixer: First cream butter, sugar, and farina and gradually add eggs one at a time until smooth. Sift all dry



ingredients and set aside. Mix in orange rind/juice and almonds. Add dry ingredients and mix until smooth.

<u>Step 2.</u> Pour into 11"x7" greased pan and cook at 350 degrees for 40 minutes.

Step 3. Cut into triangles after cooling.

<u>Step 4.</u> Add hot simple sugar syrup slowly until completely immersed in syrup. Make sure you put on the outer part of the cake as it can be the drier part.

This can be stored for a week in a cool area or refrigerated.

Mango Sticky Rice

From Tip Neer Ingredients

- 350 grams of glutinous rice
- 1 box coconut milk
- ³/₄ cup granulated sugar
- 1 + ¼ tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. rice flour
- 4-5 pandan leaves
- Ripe mango Preparation

Step 1. Wash the glutinous/

sticky rice and soak it in water overnight.

Step 2. Add water to a steamer and place over

medium-high heat. Wait until the water boils. Then drain the sticky rice and wrap it in a thin cloth. Place about 2 pandan leaves in the steamer and steam. Steam for about 30 minutes until the sticky rice is cooked.

Step 3. Set aside 34 cup of coconut milk. For the remaining milk, put it in a small pot. Add sugar and 1 tsp. of salt. Then put it on low heat. Add the remaining pandan leaves to the coconut milk pot. Stir continuously with a spatula until the sugar dissolves. Do not let the coconut milk lump. Wait until the coconut milk boils, then turn off the stove and set aside. Step 4. Scoop cooked sticky rice into a mixing bowl, pour in hot coconut milk, stir quickly, then cover and let the sticky rice stay warm for about 15 minutes.

Step 5. Mix ³/₄ cup of coconut milk that has been set aside with rice flour and salt. Bring to a boil and stir continuously until the coconut milk thickens and boils. Use this part of the recipe for the topping.

Step 6. Scoop sticky rice onto a plate, pour the prepped coconut milk topping over it, and serve with ripe mango.

Butternut Squash Soup

From Maria Pastrana Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp. unsalted butter
- 1 yellow onion, thinly sliced
- 4 cups butternut squash puree
- 1 Granny Smith apple, peeled, cored, and thinly sliced
- 2 cups chicken stock
- 2 small bay leaves
- 3 tsp. salt, plus more to taste
- ½ cup crème fraiche
- ¹/₄ tsp. ground coriander (optional)
- ¼ tsp. grated peeled fresh ginger
- Freshly ground pepper to taste



Preparation

Step 1. In a saucepan over medium heat, melt butter. Add onion and cook until soft, about 10 minutes. Transfer to slow cooker.

Step 2. Add the squash puree, apple, stock, bay leaves, and the 3 tsp. salt to the slow cooker and stir to combine. Cover and cook for 2 hours according to the manufacturer's instructions.

Step 3. Remove the bay leaves and discard. Add the crème fraiche. Using a stick blender, puree the soup directly in the slow cooker until it is smooth. Stir in the coriander and ginger. Add the freshly ground pepper to taste.

Mom's Enchilada Sauce

From Carmen Mead

A red enchilada sauce with the smoky spicy flavor of New Mexico red chili. This recipe was taught to mom by my paternal grandmother the old-fashioned way; watch, not a lot of measuring, taste as you go to ensure the texture, spiciness, and flavor meets your taste.

- Ingredients:
- Olive oil
- White flour
- Garlic powder
- New Mexico chili powder (should be bright red)
- Tomato sauce
- Water
- Salt
- Corn tortillas
- Grated cheddar cheese
- Diced white onions



Step 1. Brown some flour in the oil until light blond, then add garlic powder. Continue browning until medium blond/ brown.

Step 2. Take the pan off the heat. Add some chili powder and stir. Begin adding tomato sauce, continuing to stir. Add a bit of water and salt. Put back on low/medium heat, cooking and stirring until it reaches your desired thickness.

Step 3. Add more water or sauce as needed while cooking. Keep testing for flavor as you go, adding chili powder, garlic powder, or salt as needed.

Step 4. Start softening the tortillas in the sauce. It is important to add more olive oil to the mixture at this time as it helps to keep the tortillas flexible. The ratio can be 1 part oil to 3 parts sauce or 2 parts to 2 parts depending on your taste. After softening, place the tortillas on a plate. Don't do too many at one time; try to fill while warm.

Step 5. In a 13" x 9" pan, drizzle a bit of sauce on the bottom so the enchiladas don't stick. Place a softened tortilla down, place one to two tablespoons down the center and a sprinkle of diced onion. Roll and place seam side down. Fill the tray, then pour the leftover sauce on top and top with more grated cheese.

Step 6. Bake in a 375-degree oven until melty, then enjoy. The sauce is also good to have on hand just to put on eggs, tacos, or burritos.

Christmas in Ireland

From the spirited celebrations in Latin America to the cozy gatherings in Europe, each country brings its unique flavor to holiday festivities. Despite the variations in customs, the underlying themes of love, family, and community resonate universally, reminding us of the joy and hope that this season brings. As people around the globe gather to celebrate, they create lasting memories that highlight the true spirit of Christmas —togetherness and goodwill across cultures.



For my part, being born and raised in Ireland, my traditions were greatly influenced by family and religion. In the weeks leading up to Christmas Day, the primary tasks were baking a Christmas cake and Christmas pudding, and wrapping the many boxes of biscuits that my family gave as presents. Then on Christmas Eve, my father drove my brothers and me from house to house so we could deliver the biscuits. While we were at

this task, my mother and my sisters stayed home preparing the feast for the next day.

On Christmas Day, the first and primary duty was to go to Mass. This was followed by visitation to local graveyards to decorate family graves. Following this began the first of many "Christmas visits," stopping into the homes of family and friends to wish all the joy of the season.

Here in Cameron Station, we have a multicultural neighborhood with celebrations by residents based on their cultural origin. But one aspect of the holiday that I believe is shared widely by Cameron Station residents is the underlying themes of love, family, and community spirit.

Whatever your beliefs, I hope everyone enjoys the season and can find enough joy in your heart to share with others.

Philippine Christmas Traditions

Due to the country's history and predominant religion, the Philippines has been known to observe the world's longest Christmas season. Anecdotally, Filipinos celebrate Christmas six months of the year. The other six months? They are spent preparing for the next holiday season. It is not surprising that starting the first of September, Christmas songs are already playing in people's homes, throughout the malls, and in vehicles everywhere.

One Christmas tradition that has been around since the 16th century is the *Simbang Gabi*, a series of nine days of masses held mostly in the early hours of the morning from December 16 to 24. Introduced by Spanish friars, this arrangement allowed the

farmers to hear mass before heading to the fields at sunrise. Across the country, the tradition continues to be celebrated to this day. It is a popular belief that whoever completes the nine *Simbang Gabi* masses can make a wish and it will come true.



Putting up a *parol* outside the house, in the office, and along the streets is another hallmark of Christmas in the Philippines. A *parol* is a lantern that comes in various sizes and is usually star-shaped to represent the Star of Bethlehem. While traditionally created using bamboo strips and Japanese paper,

modern *parols* can be constructed using other materials such as metal or plastic. Another tradition is the display of the *belen*, a tableau depicting the nativity scene.

Like most celebrations, food takes center stage in all Christmas festivities. After the *Simbang Gabi* mass, churchgoers partake of the local delicacies such as *putobumbong* and *bibingka* (rice cakes), purchased from vendors who set up shop by the parish entrance. On Christmas Eve, families gather together and share a *Noche Buena* feast that may consist of *lechon* (roasted pig), *lumpia* (fried spring rolls), and *pancit* (stir-fried noodles), accompanied by drinks along with plenty of music and laughter.

Chinese New Year

Chinese Lunar New Year, also known as the Spring Festival, is the most important traditional holiday in Chinese culture. Celebrated on the first day of the Chinese lunar calendar, which falls between January 21 and February 20, it marks both the start



of a new year and the arrival of spring. The festival is a time for family reunions, paying respects to ancestors, and wishing for prosperity and good fortune in the year ahead.

Preparations for the celebration begin weeks in advance, with families cleaning their homes to sweep away bad luck and decorating with red lanterns, couplets, and banners, symbols of happiness, wealth, and

longevity. On New Year's Eve, a lavish family dinner takes place, featuring dishes like dumplings, fish, and rice cakes, each symbolizing wealth, harmony, and good health.

In my family, traditions like playing Mahjong and watching the "New Year's Gala" on television are cherished. Children are especially excited, as it's the one time of year they're allowed to stay up late until the clock strikes midnight. At that moment, we all go outside to light fireworks together, ushering in the new year with joy and celebration.



Thanks to General Manager Steve Philbin for this update.

FY2024 has been a very productive year. The management team has initiated and managed \$1 million in reserve projects that have significant impact on the community, while managing all day-to-day operations within a \$2.5 million budget.

Among the 2024 accomplishments was the completion of a threeyear paving project. This year was exceptionally challenging due to the need to coordinate the paving of Cameron Station Boulevard with the city of Alexandria. Once the city completed its work, we finished Phase 3 of the community streets

within Cameron Station, within budget and with minimal inconvenience to residents.

Prior to initiating the white coat process on the pools, we began replacing the Cameron Club flat roof and shingled roof. In addition, the Cameron Club interior was painted, and new carpeting installed throughout the club. In the Victoria Hebert Great Room, we completed some moisture barrier

work. We continue to complete LED light rehabilitation in the clubhouse, which should produce savings to the Association's electric expense.

Other 2024 projects included power washing and painting the Cameron Station fence along Duke Street; completing the third year of a bench replacement project (we complete approximately six benches per year); and replacing two HVAC systems in the Fitness Center and Great Room, both within budget and with minimal inconvenience to the community. The community streetlight LED retrofit continues as current lights fail, with expected

savings to electric bills based on the work completed.

The majority of the reserve projects for the year have been successfully completed, and we are now planning for FY25. All of these projects help your property values by maintaining a positive impression of the community and helping to ensure that Cameron Station remains as beautiful tomorrow as it is today!

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Activities & Events Committee

The Activities and Events Committee (A&E) organized another year full of exciting events for Cameron Station. The fun began with Trivia Night in March, which aligned with St. Patrick's Day, followed by the popular "Eggstravaganza" Egg Hunt near Easter. Residents also enjoyed the return of Bingo Night, a lively Fourth of July Celebration, the annual Pool Party, a Tiki-themed Party, and a Halloween Party. A festive Holiday Party is planned for December to close out the year.

We extend special thanks to Aaron Podolsky for sponsoring the Fourth of July celebration and to Irina Babb for sponsoring the Halloween party and ice cream socials.

Looking ahead to 2025, A&E plans to continue hosting many of the same popular events, including the semi-annual yard sales in spring and fall, potential shuttle trips, and more ice cream socials. These activities wouldn't be possible without the help of our volunteers. Your support at events is always appreciated! A&E is excited to bring another year of memorable and fun-filled events to Cameron Station in 2025.

Architectural Review Committee

The Architectural Review Committee (ARC) is responsible for reviewing homeowner applications for any modification or improvement to their property in Cameron Station. The committee has had a busy 2024, with over 125 applications review to date. Typically, the applications submitted by homeowners are to replace landscaping, paint shutters and doors, install solar panels, or a myriad of other property improvements. The majority of applications this year were for roof replacements, because the average age of roofs in Cameron Station is over 20 years, which is at the end of a roof's practical lifespan. The ARC has an expedited review process if a homeowner unexpectedly needs their roof quickly repaired and/or replaced.

Our new CAMP on-site covenants administrator is Avante Thomas. Avante provides support to the ARC during its regular meetings and assists homeowners in preparing applications for the ARC's review.

Lastly, the ARC is heavily involved in the revisions to the Design & Maintenance Standards (DMS). Some of the proposed changes include streamlining the approval of straightforward ARC applications and revising requirements for exterior décor, lighting, and storage.

The ARC looks forward to working with residents in 2025 to help them realize their vision that will further enhance the architectural character of Cameron Station!

Common Area Committee

The Common Area Committee (CAC) is committed to enhancing our community's common areas and addressing the needs and concerns of our residents.

Year in Review

<u>Donovan Pocket Park:</u> The decline of the original linden trees led to a redesign of the park, which features cherry trees around the perimeter and updated landscaping, while retaining the turf area at the center.

<u>California and Helmuth Pocket Park:</u> The cleanup of this park has enhanced its usability and beauty.

<u>Conservation Garden:</u> Donated by Lancaster Landscapes, this project in the common area of Barbour Drive will help manage storm water runoff, benefit the environment, and add native plants and beauty to the area.

<u>Drainage Improvements:</u> These were a key focus this year and involved regrading and adding swales to reduce erosion across the community.

<u>Ongoing Maintenance:</u> Monthly walk-throughs were conducted to review the condition of common areas and identify problem spots.

Looking Ahead

<u>Pocket Park Refurbishments:</u> Refurbishing one or two parks to address declining vegetation and enhance their beauty and functionality.

Existing Irrigation System Review and Assessment: Plus research into technologies that may better serve our community in the future.

Continued Management of Common Areas: Including replacing declining trees and trimming trees as needed, plus ongoing reviews of areas that require attention. We look forward to another productive year and appreciate your continued support and involvement.

Communications Committee

As we close out 2024, the Communications Committee (ComCom) reflects on a successful year of keeping our community informed and engaged through new initiatives. We published our first blog post for *The Compass* in February, revamped the Cameron Station website, and enhanced our weekly email blast, now rebranded as *The Cameron Station Connection*. Over 130 new households were welcomed by our dedicated Welcome Committee, and a successful in-person Welcome Event introduced them to the community.

The Compass published over 50 blog posts, highlighting community stories and events. Our newsletter team worked tirelessly on this 32-page printed issue, capturing the year's biggest moments. Social media engagement grew as more residents contributed photos for *The Cameron Station Connection* and social media, showcasing the beauty and spirit of Cameron Station.

Looking ahead to 2025, we'll continue improving the website, maintaining *The Cameron Station Connection* as a timely source of updates, and expanding Welcome Events to twice a year. *The Compass* blog will keep sharing stories, and we'll launch a "TechTalk" to help residents navigate the website. We welcome your ideas and contributions as we strive to make 2025 our best year yet!

Financial Advisory Committee

The Financial Advisory Committee (FAC) advises the Board of Directors on issues affecting the financial position of Cameron Station Community Association. We have been very fortunate to have a robust, financially sound community and very low delinquency rates of lower than 1 percent (typical range is 3% to 5%). Following is a look back at some of FAC's 2024 activities and our plans for 2025:

Throughout the year, on a monthly basis, the FAC meets and reviews the financial statements prepared by CAMP, our management company. The reviews are line-by-line and focus on the month's actual vs. budgeted expenses, as well as yearto-date and year-end projections and variances. The FAC also reviews the expenditures and commitments of the other Master Association committees and is available to assist other committees, as requested, with regard to budget and/or other financial matters.

The FAC is responsible for maintaining the appropriate balances for the Repair and Replacement Reserve Fund (R&R Fund), as well as the Operating Reserve Fund, and recommending investment strategies for both.

And last, though by no means least, the FAC reviews the annual budget as prepared by the managing agent and makes recommendations to the Board of Directors. The 2025 budget (including reserve contributions) will be in the range of \$3.0 million.

Cameron Club Facilities Committee

Where We Have Been

This has been a very productive year as the Cameron Club Facilities Committee (CCFC) continues to work at making our residents' clubhouse experience an even better one. Over the last 20 years, the CCFC has developed a replacement plan for our fitness equipment, which ensures all our items are budgeted for.

• We replaced three elliptical machines due to their usage rate and age.

- We replaced one of our two Pelotons.
- We added an 11th complimentary fitness class.

• We extended the early-morning, weekday pool swim hours by a full hour: they are now 6am-9am.

• We also added an additional swim lane in the evening, Monday-Thursday, to accommodate residents' desires for more swim lanes.

Where We Are Going

The CCFC strives to be proactive in supporting residents' well-being and health. We continually examine fitness center equipment needs, and we always appreciate our residents' feedback. Our pool furniture is weathered and dated, so we are also looking at more comfortable pool furniture.

Finally, we would like to shine a spotlight on these tremendous assets to our community:

Psy Scott, our superb fitness instructor, has led hundreds of fitness classes here and offered outstanding fitness advice to hundreds of our residents. Psy is a true Cameron Station icon to be thanked and appreciated.

Assistant Community Manager Angles Robles has moved on, and he will be greatly missed. We appreciate all the work he did on our behalf, and we wish him well.

Last, but not least, Mark Bondurant, our maintenance technician, works on a broad range of issues both in the clubhouse, on the pool deck, and throughout Cameron Station. We are grateful for his skill and tireless efforts to maintain and improve our cherished community!
